# ENHANCING COMMUNICATION FOR SAFETY AND SECURITY PERSONNEL IN SCHOOL AND COLLEGE CAMPUSES

The goal of the School Violence Prevention Program (SVPP) is to improve security at schools and on school grounds through the implementation of evidence-based school safety programs and technology. SVPP awards will contribute to this goal by funding projects which include <u>funding of civilian</u> personnel to serve as coordinators with law enforcement, training for local law enforcement officers, the purchase and installation of certain allowable equipment and technology, and other measures to significantly improve school safety.





#### **Eligible Applicants**:

"City or Township Governments, Independent School Districts, Native American Tribal Governments (Federally Recognized), State Governments, Unrestricted (open to any type of entity above), subject to any clarification in text field entitled as additional Information on Eligibility, Other..."

- School site alarm and protection systems—Motion detectors
- Lighting (on school grounds)

**Supplies:** 

Supplies include any materials that are expended or consumed during the SVPP project. Such costs may include training manuals, paper, printer ink, pens, postage, etc.

#### **Contracts/Consultants/Subawards:**

Consultant expenses and contracts include goods or services that directly contribute to the implementation or enhancement of the SVPP project. The use of a consultant should be more economical than direct employment. Contractor/consultant costs may include costs to provide one-time training to staff for equipment operation or use and contracting/consulting services that provide such things as needs analysis, installation, and testing.

#### **Other costs:**

Items not included in the previous categories but that have a direct correlation to the overall success of a recipient's project objectives and are necessary for the project to reach full implementation will be considered on a case-by-case basis by the COPS Office. Costs may include:

- Shipping costs
- School safety assessments
  Fencing, gates, or poles (for lights or cameras)





The goal of the STOP School Violence Program is to assist county, local, territorial, and tribal jurisdictions in improving efforts to reduce violent crime in and around schools.

With this solicitation, BJA seeks to increase school safety by implementing training that will improve school climate using school-based behavioral threat assessments and/or intervention teams to identify school violence risks among students, technological solutions shown to increase school safety such as anonymous reporting technology, and other school safety strategies that assist in preventing violence.

#### **Continuation Funding Intent:**

BJA may, in certain cases, provide additional funding in future years to awards made under this solicitation through continuation awards. OJP will consider, among other factors, OJP's strategic priorities, a recipient's overall management of the award, and the award-funded work's progress, when making continuation award decisions.



#### **Eligible Equipment**

Develop and operate technology solutions such as anonymous reporting systems (ARS) for threats of school violence, including <u>mobile telephone applications</u>, <u>hotlines</u>, <u>websites</u>, or <u>other school safety technology solutions</u>, for accurate identification of danger (without resorting to discriminatory stereotypes or violating privacy) or <u>other technology solutions</u> <u>shown to improve school safety</u>. Applicants will demonstrate in their applications or with attached letters of support or memorandums of understanding (MOUs) that they have the support of relevant team partners, including <u>local law enforcement</u>.

Applicants should also discuss how this system will not duplicate <u>but complement</u> existing ARS systems in the jurisdiction or state. Applicants will need to detail how the data collected through this system is handled, secured, and shared and review data to ensure there is no disparate impact based on race, ethnicity, or disability in outcomes.



#### **Digital Trust**

Technological devices, artificial intelligence, predictive analytics, and other data-driven solutions ("Technological Enhancements") are increasingly used to augment crime reduction strategies and efforts. Care must be taken to assess and address any potential harm that could be activated by these solutions to ensure privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties are protected. <u>Applicants proposing to utilize grant funds to support technological enhancements directly or via training and technical assistance may receive priority consideration if their proposal addresses tenets of digital trust such as:</u>

- How the technology will be carefully implemented through training of personnel and the setting and enforcement of policies governing its use to ensure that it contributes to positive outcomes for public safety, the community, and/or the criminal justice system.
- How the applicant will safeguard privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties throughout the duration of the project period.

#### **Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (ARPA)**

The U.S. Department of Treasury is the federal agency distributing the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds ("State, Local, and Tribal Aid") appropriation totaling \$360 Billion. This aid will consist of the following:

- \$350 Billion to State, Local and Tribal governments
- \$10 Billion in a Capital Projects Fund

#### **Eligible Use of Funds:**

Treasury has stated that within the following categories of eligible uses, recipients will have broad flexibility to decide how best to use this funding to meet the needs of their communities:

- Replace lost public sector revenue, using this funding to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic
- Respond to the far-reaching public health and negative economic impacts of the pandemic, by supporting the health of communities, and helping households, small businesses, impacted industries, nonprofits, and the public sector recover from economic impacts



#### **Eligible Use of Funds (Cont.):**

- Provide premium pay for essential workers, offering additional support to those who have borne and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical infrastructure sectors; and,
- Invest in water, sewer, and <u>broadband infrastructure</u>, making necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water, support vital wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and to expand access to broadband internet



The <u>Final Rule</u> gives recipients broad latitude to use funds for the provision of government services to the extent of reduction in revenue. Government services can include, <u>but are not limited to</u>, maintenance of infrastructure or pay-go spending for building new infrastructure, including roads; <u>modernization of cybersecurity</u>, <u>including hardware</u>, <u>software</u>, <u>and protection of critical infrastructure</u>; <u>health services</u>; environmental remediation; <u>school or educational services</u>; <u>and the provision of police</u>, <u>fire</u>, <u>and other public safety services</u>.

#### **Period of Performance**

The State, Local, and Tribal Aid Funds being administered by the U.S. Department of Treasury provides the following important dates:

All funds <u>must be obligated by</u>: <u>December 31, 2024</u>

All funds <u>must be expended by</u>: <u>December 31, 2026</u>

#### **NONPROFIT SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM (NSGP)**

Many private schools, including religious schools, have received assistance through the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP) for security improvements.

NSGP recipients were awarded grants of up to \$100,000 based on risk analysis, anticipated effectiveness, and integration with state and local law enforcement.

### IMPORTANCE OF DE-OBLIGATED / RE-OBLIGATED FUNDS

#### What is a De-Obligation of Funds?

A de-obligation of funds is a subrecipients cancellation or downward adjustment of previously awarded funds based on recipient/subrecipients cost savings or inability to expend all or any part of awarded funds.

#### What is a Re-Obligation of Funds?

De-obligated funds may be Re-obligated to a new subrecipient within the availability of time remaining in the Period of Performance (PoP) of the federal grant.

#### **ACCESSING DE-OBLIGATED FUNDS**

De-obligated funds may be accessed by contacting the state administrative agency (or recipient jurisdiction in the case of stimulus funds) that is administering the federal grant program/funds.

#### WHO IS PS GRANTS?

PS Grants is an organization that provides free grants assistance and services to public sector and tribal entities that:

- Don't have the necessary budget to support paid grants assistance and services through a third party (i.e., not all grants permit use of funds for this purpose);
- Don't want to or can't afford to obligate project funding for this purpose (i.e., grant application caps);
- Need assistance in understanding the federal grants landscape (i.e., agency employees new to grants); or
- ► Require assistance in navigating federal grant guidance documents and application process (i.e., Notice of Funding Opportunity, Solicitation documents).



### HOW PS GRANTS CAN ASSIST PUBLIC SECTOR ENTITIES

#### PS Grants can provide the following assistance:

- Create educational grant resources
- Host public educational grant webinars for public sector entities
- Serve as a referral for public sector entities seeking grant assistance guidance, including:
  - Assess a project to determine the applicable funding source(s) based on jurisdiction, demographics, discipline(s), applicant eligibility, cost eligibility, etc.
  - Identify all federal programs that the customer can consider for funding the project
  - Discuss eligibility criteria and where to access the information in grant guidance/criteria
  - Provide customer with guidance on how to access grant programs at the federal/state/local government levels (i.e., engage the grant administrator or policy/decision making body)
  - Provide customer with successful tips on completing a grant application
